Director's Statement

Born and raised in Sweden, a society where people pride themselves on independence and where strangers typically don't talk to one another before a few drinks. I often felt out of place in a culture that could be perceived as cold and judgmental. Living there, I experienced alienation and often observed it in others around me.

Loneliness, a pervasive and often dominant emotion, remains a seldom-discussed topic. In the aftermath of the pandemic, it is crucial for society to openly address negative emotions. BFFR not only promises entertainment but also seeks to shed light on loneliness, fostering healthy and therapeutic conversations about this shared human experience.

The film takes a playful yet thoughtful approach to loneliness, focusing on the protagonist, Angelica, and the lengths she goes to combat her sense of isolation. Comedy, in my view, is a powerful medium to connect with people. BFFR uses humor to effectively delve into challenging issues, offering both entertainment and insight into the complexities of loneliness and human connection.



A conversation with the director, writer, and actor Erika Apelgren

What inspired the story, and how did that shape the narrative?

The inspiration for the film, BFFR, stems from the conceptual idea that unfolds as a proof of concept in this short. The revelation of what BFFR stands for is a key element. In creating the narrative, I deliberately crafted two characters who are polar opposites. As the saying goes in writing, the challenge is to create characters and place them in the most adverse situations.

The essence of storytelling is witnessing characters evolve and grow. As a writer, I posed questions to myself about the difficulties and discomfort each character could face. BFFR, in particular, explores the incredible discomfort experienced by both characters, with Angelica having made a bold move before the story begins. The film follows her struggle with this discomfort, portraying a desperate quest for connection.

Why does this film matter? Why now?

The significance of our film lies in addressing the widespread issue of loneliness and the absence of meaningful connections, which are universal challenges. With London often referred to as the loneliest city globally and research from The Roots of Loneliness project identifying over 100 types of loneliness, it's evident that this is a complex and pervasive problem. Statistics reveal that 52% of Americans admit to feeling lonely, and 47% find their relationships lacking in meaningfulness. The health implications of loneliness are profound, making it a crucial topic for discussion.

Our film serves as a societal commentary, not only shining a light on loneliness but also delving into the impact of technology and the instant gratification mentality prevalent in our consumer society. By pressing a button, we seek immediate satisfaction, displaying impatience that has detrimental effects on our society. The film aims to stimulate conversations about these interconnected issues, urging reflection on the state of our societal values and connections.

How did you work with the cast to convey the emotional depth and authenticity of their performances?

Collaborating with the exceptionally skilled Sharon Gardner was a delightful experience, as she brought a wealth of talent to the set. Our process involved in-depth discussions about the character, delving into who she is, her motivations, and the essence of Angelica Sinsoire. We dedicated time to a rehearsal session, blocking out scenes and exploring the character's background.

My approach values the trust that each actor arrives on set well-prepared, and Sharon certainly demonstrated that commitment. I encourage actors to engage in collaboration, and improvisation, and to infuse their unique perspectives into their portrayal of the character. This allows them the freedom to breathe life into the role in a way that is distinctly their own.

The essence of filmmaking lies in using the script as a foundation and then collectively breathing life into it, drawing from the diverse perspectives each member of the team brings to the table.

How do you as a director approach the use of visual elements and subtle details to enhance the narrative and evoke a specific atmosphere in your film?

As a director, I focus on creating an aesthetically beautiful film that reflects the characters' essence through careful consideration of visual elements. Inspired by the polished, dark feel of 'House of Cards,' I aimed for a similar atmospheric quality, blending camera work, movement, and sound. Being a fan of Wes Anderson, I decided to integrate elements reminiscent of his work, such as the cue cards designed with his distinctive style. These cues serve as a nod to Anderson's unique storytelling approach, adding a layer of intrigue for the audience.

Collaborating with DP Eduardo Whaite, I conveyed the emotional tone and trusted his expertise during the shoot, allowing me to concentrate on directing. Costumes and hairstyles were chosen to symbolize characters; Angelica's French twist reflects her emotional character, while Patricia's messy hair embodies her carefree spirit. Each visual detail contributes to the film's narrative and overall atmosphere.
